# John Davis Woodturning Centre

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

With the aid of the Nobo board on a number of occasions various methods where explained along with some do's and don'ts, the second half of the evening concentrated on cutting both parts of the soon to be box, and you shouldn't be surprised to know they fitted together very well, the outside of the box will be finished in her workshop. And with that Julie took a couple of steps back and the demonstration had finished to which the audience gave a good round of applause, and quite right too. Don got up and said a few words that encouraged another round.

During the evening there where a good number of questions answered and in the tea break a crowd took the opportunity to take a closer look at the cutters and

progress on the project so far. I have to say before tonight I hadn't even considered thinking about thread cutting and wasn't expecting to take much notice until I was, however Julie managed to make this subject very interesting and more importantly she was entertaining. I was watching with keen interest and trying to note the detail of the work that has fascinated me to the point that I will try it as soon as I can get the tools and quality timber to work with. That's what I call a good demonstration and I'm sure a number of our members have gone home with the same interest as me.

There was something pleasantly different about tonight's demonstrator and I'm having a problem explaining it, Julie has a bubbly personality and settled in with our friendly club right away, she has a good sense of humour and just fitted in with us like old friends. She knew just how much knowledge was needed without getting too deep in the theory, for example, when allowing for the extra diameter on the spigot for the cutting of the thread, she knew to a decimal point how much it was but simply said, "I just add a bit". I don't know that I've done Julie justice in my write up but I'm sure you readers will understand what I'm trying to say.

#### Julie Heryet - Biography

My first steps into the realms of woodturning were taken almost by accident.

During years living in New Zealand in the mid-1990s, I enrolled on a woodworking evening course. At that time my thoughts were more of tables and cabinets rather than of hollow forms and chasing threads. In a moment of workshop exploration, I found a lathe, had a play and was immediately smitten.

Guided by the experience, patience and kindness of members of the West Auckland Woodturners Guild, the next few steps toward learning the basic skills were taken.

Returning to the UK in 1998, I set about developing those skills, using every opportunity to practice and to learn from others. Of particular importance has been my membership of two local woodturning clubs; Avon & Bristol Woodturners (affiliated to the Association of Woodturners of GB) and the Gloucestershire Association of Woodturners.

I am particularly excited by working with wet wood; straight from the log I gain much of my inspiration. I endeavour to produce hollow forms, vessels and sculptural pieces that I hope reflect a lifelong love and veneration of trees. Working with wood is both a pleasure and an honour; working wet wood straight from the log retains this connexion. I enjoy the immediacy and spontaneity of working timber on a lathe, be it a finished article or a medium upon which to then apply further creative processes.

I do however use seasoned timber, as this is necessary for producing hand-threaded boxes.

Whether the items are functional or purely decorative; whether the timber is plain or highly figured, form and sensuous curves are paramount in complementing the timber's inherent beauty and honouring the tree's history and grace.



<u>New Members are the life blood of our club, do "YOU" know of</u> anyone who might like to come along for a visit?

#### Intermediate/Advanced

#### <u>April 07 - 250mm Bowl</u>

Roughing out and cutting a few 100mm size bowls, as a practice will help decide which cutting and re-joining process to adopt for the larger finished bowl.

The joint or joints in this bowl should be a feature and part of the overall design. Also consider the use of spacers and alternative materials in the joining process.

#### May 07 - Frame for 200mm square mirror.

An opportunity to decide whether to make a traditional "square frame for a square mirror that sits flat and square against the wall" or to be more adventurous.

The frame could be rectangular, radiating or have two sides if the mirror has polished edges i.e. mirror tile.

#### June 07 - Two boxes - joined.

The two boxes and the method of joining probably need to be thought out together rather than, making two boxes and finding a way of joining them. Either approach must be acceptable.

#### **Beginners**

#### April 07 - Turned Decorated Goose size egg and eggcup.

The goose egg is the standard unit. What form you turn to hold it is your choice. Decoration on one or both carving, colouring, pyrography, inlay etc.

#### May 07 - Candleholder with a wax ball candle.

Like the egg above the wax ball candle is the standard. Set yourself the challenge of drawing out some good classical shapes, or interpreting a modern shape from say, an architectural form.

#### Jun 07 - Spinning Top / Handle.

A Traditional toy, with variations. It was intended that this should be of the type where the top is retained in the short handle until it is spinning. Include a pull cord.

#### Mick Hanbury - Biography

Mick was born in Cyprus the son of a soldier, and travelled around Europe for most of his childhood. He spent a lot of time in Germany and hence is fluent in German and can teach in German.

He started his career as a cabinetmaker where he made all manner of artefacts. Around 18 years ago he took to woodturning and since then has grown in stature to be one of the finest artistic turners.

Mick demonstrates at local and national shows in England, USA, Germany, and Ireland and at woodturning clubs throughout the UK.

He used to be the resident tutor at Doncaster College teaching Open College Network levels 1-3 to mature students. Mick also <u>teaches</u> his specialised techniques in his workshop in Lincolnshire as well as at <u>Craft Supplies</u> (in the UK and France), and at <u>Isaac Lord</u> in High Wycombe, Buckinghamshire

#### Thermed Turning

WOW! This was some task even for a supposedly intermediate turner! I took on the challenge very apprehensively and after a bit of guidance from Derek Blake and an hour or two on the computer searching for the word "THERM" and being guided all over the Internet I decided to go to the workshop and have a go using the Magazine guide and Derek's advice.

After half an hour finding the right wood and bolting it together I started the lathe. There is nothing more frightening than loading your lathe with two blocks of wood, (picture 1) which are bolted together and spinning it at about 400rpm. I had an escape route worked out and had advised the family not to enter the workshop.

Well things went well and I progressed too two half rounded faces (picture 2) I then unbolted the two pieces of wood and reversed them re-bolted and successfully turned the other sides. I must admit I got a great kick out of seeing the finished items (picture 3). I then proceeded to place the first turned block between centres and make a bud vase remembering that I needed to turn one end to enable me to hold it in a chuck. This done I drilled, turned and finished the vase and proudly showed the family (picture 4).

I then proceeded to turn the other block of turned wood into another vase of slightly different dimensions WHY! Because I had not read the laid down task properly. It "stated that a PAIR of Dried grass holders were required." So back to the lathe and more bolting wood together, more turning, eventually after a day of trial and error I achieved another vase but unfortunately as I was applying the final polish it came off the lathe crashed into the garage wall and I had to start all over again! Eventually after a lot of perseverance I achieved a pair of Bud Vases, (picture 5) which my family liked but the big challenge was whether "ERIC" would like them. It was a very challenging task and considering I have very little artistic or engineering skills, in the end I was proud to make something unusual with out too many disasters David Jenkins happening!

#### Sanding Internal Parts of Small Turnings

To sand the internal parts of bud vases or other small turnings, or any small awkward openings, I keep handy a selectrion (4 rods actually) of wooden rods, about 300mm long and of different diameters between 6mm and 20mm. I either cut the ends off at an angle or round them over.

To the ends of these rods I attach a suitable length (about 40mm) of the required grit cloth with double sided adhesive carpet tape. The grit cloth should be flexible enough to bend round the stick easily or it will straighten and come off. Grit papers will not stay bent round nor will some of the heavier cloths. In some cases I let the cloth go past the end of the rod by a few millimetres, and I find that it bends round to cover the end of the rod when in use. I use both ends of each rod with a fine grit at one end and a coarser grit at the other.

As a refinement to this I place a 10mm thick piece of foam plastic (an old cut up shower sponge) in between the rod and the grit cloth. Double sided adhesive tape is used to stick the sponge to the rod and another piece to hold the cloth to the sponge. This is sometimes advantageous where the shape to be sanded is curved.

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
