

Ouch That Smarts

Anyway, there I was in front of the lathe, with it running at around 1000rpm, gouge in hand, offering it up to the wood. Bang.... Too much too soon, the dig in caused the wood to leave the jaws and smack straight into my face.

I came to on the floor, covered in blood and not knowing what damage I had done to myself. I managed to stand, grabbed a huge wad of kitchen roll and went to the house to see Mike. Being an ex fireman he wasn't overly fazed, but had me down at St Richards post haste.

The argument I had with the wood only resulted in lots of swelling, two black eyes, superficial cuts, a fat lip and possible broken nose. I think I came second in that fight. I haven't added any photographs to this article as I looked like I had been in the ring with Mike Tyson and was not a pretty sight. Enjoy the cartoons through. They look better than I did.

Whilst my injuries were not as bad as they looked or as bad as they could have been, I now have a more healthy respect for the equipment I have and will make sure that I do not put myself in that situation again.

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Open Weekend

Once a year we open our doors to the public for a whole weekend, it's a brilliant time because every club member gets involved in some way, we draw on our resources and the results are amazing.

<u>The night before</u>, By the time the members arrived on the Friday evening the lathes where pretty much set up and the Gallery backdrop and table area had been erected, this work is best done with only a small number of members otherwise you get distracted and it all goes pear shaped. So now it was time to let the members loose using their imagination, skills and enthusiasm to dress the hall with boughs of holly, fa la la la la, sorry but that just followed having sung that carol a good many times, just dress the hall. The members did a brilliant job and if I wore a hat I'd take it of to them, it was brilliant. Now I would like to take a few minutes of your valuable time to explain how we, the club did it.

Last year we had a committee to set up this weekend, this year I was sure of the help so no committee. Once I had confirmation of a number of things it was obvious it was going to work so no more sorting other than a brief chat with Don one Sunday morning, it just fell into place that Don would sort the lathe's and turners and I would do the other things, this gave us one end of the hall each and so the door track across the room became a humorous "go back over your side of the line" wise crack. The result of everybody's efforts was a resounding success.

We had fifty prizes for the Tom-Bola table, another fifty for the public gallery, on top of this we had a good number of donations for the members raffle (to be drawn on our May turn in night) CRM at Waterlooville our local supplier, Robert Sorby and our own members gave more than 20 items giving a grand total of more than 130 donated items for the event when you include the cakes, quiche's sausage rolls, chocolate brownies biscuits and the list goes on. On our gallery table there where 54 beautifully turned pieces for the public to choose their favourite, this is an interesting area as there is a lot of discussion about why they like their piece over another, I hasten to add it was all very friendly.

I know I'm repeating myself but it has to be said, there was very little prep work on my behalf for this event, all the credit goes to the members of the Forest of Bere Wood Turners, as you can imagine there was a good many areas each with its own way of working, I had no system to finalise the gallery draw, I had no idea we would get the 120 donated prizes which would need sorting, labelling and some means to control their coming and going, the Pyrography and refreshments all need to be presented properly, collating the public choice information and explaining to the public how it works, advertising the event, and the list goes on.

But this was always going to be an easy event to manage as the club members are more than capable of working together, if they see something needs doing they get on with it, they think it through and draw on the experience they have between them. There is an increasing friendly atmosphere at our club to the point that a good many people have mentioned it and that's from members, visiting turners/demonstrators and the general public.

The event itself was well attended with a good deal of interest shown to everything we offered. Most notable for me was the linking of people together, in brief there was Simon and Cliff from the Learning Zone, there working with teenage children still of school age with problems, they came as we the club have started helping them and the children, they then got chatting to Chris and Lucy (Chris is an Arborist who did a

demo for us in October 2006) they live in the woods and have offered to assist them and Lucy has worked with trouble children and has agreed to pay a visit. Chris had a go at turning and is now well and truly hooked and can supply us with burrs and the like.

Grant, a service user at PDS Craft turned for the first time and now recognises Don, and Robin who used Pyrography to write Grants name on the finished piece. It was a real surprise when Grant followed my lead when I called out the names and numbers of the winners at the end of the day, he called out all fifty of them, a very emotional time for one particular caring person as he doesn't talk at PDS Craft? It turns out my wife knows Grants parents so they got chatting. Mark gave me a hand to return some things to Chris in the woods, Mark knew the previous Game Keeper there and has done some tree work so they got busy talking. These and I'm sure there was more I didn't hear about are the important things a club can build on, our members certainly aren't backward at coming forward.

The hall itself was filled with interesting things to see and touch, very important the touching, people must be able to pick things up and feel the object, as was explained to me a while back, pick the object up and see how it feels in the hand, its surprising how this helps when judging a piece. It seemed to me it took most people about an hour and a half to go right round the hall if they went to every table, chatted and had some refreshments. The oldest visitor was a 95 year old gentleman, who was interested in everything he saw and spent time discussing it, and the youngest was Kayleigh, she couldn't wait to get started and with jacket and goggles on Don helped her turn a dibber, Robin helped with the signing of it and to practice drawing a dragon on a piece of ply, she went home very proud of the items, I have a feeling we will see young Kayleigh again.

We had two young lads with us for most of the weekend, Dons grandson Greg and his pal Daren, (apologies if I got your name wrong, I lost my bit of paper) these two lads will be the foundation of our junior section, and the powers to be will set to putting this together ASAP. I chatted to a number of people about this over the weekend and others have shown some interest so next year we will give them their own area to use at this event.

We had much the same things as last year, the public choice gallery, things of interest, matching pairs, the raw and the turned where visitors try to pair them off, 5 lathes going with the chance to have a go, Pyrography the burning a design on wood or leather, the Tom-Bola, a display from PDS Craft, a group run by the City Council for people with learning disabilities, this showed how we the club are helping them, and finally the refreshments. To compliment all that there where members happy to explain things and generally chat about anything related. When the time came for the draw it was all arranged and ready to go, what more could you ask. And with an efficient calling of the numbers over it was time to clear the hall, This was done in around one and a half hours, which considering we had to return Kens big heavy lathe to his workshop, the public gallery display to carefully dismantle so we can use it again next year, five lathes to clear plus the shavings, cables, wood, all those prizes, kitchen to clean, floor to vac and 54 gallery items to find a home for etc it was pretty good going I thought. So once again a very big WELL DONE to all the helpers, it was a first class performance. And there goes another Open Weekend.

April Club Night

Unlike the first meetings this year I had nothing in particular to do tonight so I was hoping to just relax and enjoy the night as a member of the audience, it's a real shame that wasn't the case though as I could have done with the night off. I arrived early, just a couple of guys there chatting, I checked to see if the kettle was on and put a couple of tables up, Colin set up most though so I resorted to chairs. Then the members started to arrive and it was time to go home. Well it seemed like that because the time goes so quickly, you spend the weeks looking forward to a club night and then when it arrives its over in a flash, I guess that's because I enjoy them so much as do all our members.

So what happened in between, Ken and John sorted the tea and coffee so nothing for me there, I helped set the lathe up, chatted to Lloyd who is looking into our camera system, sorted some things for members and took some pictures, I only briefly mentioned some things to the members after Don had finished so that was quickly over so I guess I pretty much did just relax and enjoy the evening demo. So with the announcements out of the way Don introduced Les Thorne our demonstrator for tonight, 99% of our members know Les so he was quickly into the demonstration.

First he did the basic Cove, Bead, half skew type things and finished with an egg on a pedestal with definition, a cut which gives the impression of it being made from two pieces, it's very important to define the some parts of a turned piece; it's what makes it look right. There was a lot of information along the way and what I have finally got into my brain is the soft part of the grain, which is the spring growth of the wood, in this case on the piece of pine he used, was the lighter material. I was familiar with the soft and hard areas but didn't relate it to the spring growth, there's hope for me yet. You see even a demo showing the basic cuts can reveal information that perhaps some of the more advanced turners did not know.

Les then explained the bowl he was about to turn and that he had one on the counter at John Davis's shop in Stockbridge, this was for people to pick up and get the feel of the beaded outer side. So first the outside was turned to shape with a chucking point and beaded round to just under the rim, he then gave it a good blast with a blow lamp until it was quite black in places, this was then brushed with a nylon wheel in a drill to remove any bits and make it nice and smooth, then it was sprayed with matt black cellulose paint. While this was drying Les gave a very funny 5 minutes or so explanation of the basic novice using his lathe for the first time and turning a bowl, you know the sort of thing, not reading the instructions, basic things like that and yes you've guessed it, he used me as the novice, it had the gathered members in fits of laughter but I think I may have lost a bit of street credibility because of it, that's if I had any to start with?

So back to the bowl, I think it was Lime wax that went on next and a good coating it got to, this was brush and cloth polished to a nice soft sheen. With the bowl reverse chucked the inside was turned and a nice shape turned in the centre, from the outside of the centre shape to just under the rim it was scratched is the easiest way to explain it, and lightly sanded, and with a touch of polish it was done. It was well after 10pm by now but it was well worth it. Don thanked Les and the audience applauded in appreciation for a brilliant, well balanced, humorous informative demonstration.

The reason it was so late was because we had our Open Weekend raffle at the half time break, with so many prizes donated it went on for some time, next year we will keep the meeting after the Open Weekend as a turn in. So after the competition results we had the draw for tonight's raffle as the hall was cleared. But that's not all, I mentioned young Kayleigh in the Open Weekend write up, I wrote "I have a feeling we

will see young Kayleigh again." Well I was right, as part of the turning tuition fee they are invited to a club night to see what we do and Kayleigh wanted to do just that so she did. I explained it may not be so interesting for a young person at a demonstration but this did not deter her. At this point I have to say well done to Les, his demonstration was all that I said in the previous paragraph for the whole audience, from young Kayleigh to the eldest most experienced turners. Both Kayleigh and her mum Helen really enjoyed the evening and a plus was she won a prize in the draw and Derek gave her the bowl blank he won, she now wants to know when she can come round and turn it. What more can I say other than many thanks again to Les and a big thank you to all the members as it's you who make it the friendly club it is.

So that was it, all over in a flash, although I still remember Les picking on me, I've booked a course of counselling sessions but they don't hold up much hope for me. To be fair John Davis and Carol's misfortunes where mentioned as well, they are both separate incidents, at different places, not together and at different times you understand; I'm burying myself aren't I, I'm beginning to wish I hadn't mentioned them now. 



Intermediate/Advanced

July 07 - 600mm High Turned Structure

With the help of all those lovely scraps 'that are too good to throw away' let your mind run free and make 'something' 600mm high. Other dimensions are your choice but individual 'scraps' should be no bigger than your hand span.

August 07 - Working Drawing

Accurately turn the object shown in the working drawing supplied by Rick Smith.

<u>September 07 – Research and Turn</u>

The aim here is to explore the myriad of modern well-designed forms of packaging i.e. bottles, boxes etc. then translate and make your choice into a functional and/or decorative item.

Please bring the original package or a photograph.

Beginners

July 07 - Cheese Platter

Probably the first priority is to have a food friendly surface i.e. sycamore, marble. These materials may be set into or on the 250mm diameter base.

Ideally the wood should be quarter sawn to reduce the risk of distortion.

Drilling into the 20mm thick vertical edge – not the horizontal rim, can be tricky – especially with the larger diameter drills. Forstner bits work well. Plugs do not have to be finish flush with the surface and can be made from a wide range of materials.

Quick Tips

Use an empty Hot Stuff bottle for oil. It is easy to deliver it drop by drop. The nozzle may be cut to a suitable size outlet hole. If the original nozzle is past further use, you can buy a packet of new nozzles. I find this works well for oiling my Record lathe bearing that requires only two or three drops of oil occasionally. Make sure you mark the bottle well so you don't squirt the oil where you need glue.

Use an old plastic card (e.g. Visa) behind grit cloth where there is a need to keep the edge sharp. I find it helps on other occasions too. Not very often as for most jobs the fingers are adequate. The plastic card will bend into most easy shapes and spreads the pressure from fingers just a little bit more.

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
