Stewart started by stating that before taking up Woodturner he had been a schoolteacher for many years teaching English.

Stewart stated that this evening would be about applying colour to your turned piece using many different techniques. Taking a bowl blank Stewart trued up the face and


Turning the lathe speed down to around 300 rpm and using a paintbrush applied a circle of paint around the centre of the blank. The lathes speed was increased and the paint flowed outwards as seen in **Photo 7**. Applying extra colours in the


















During the whole of Stewart's demonstration the equipment that he used was either Air Brushes of which he had six all filled with different colours or applying the dyes with a brush or swabs of paper toweling. The dyes that he used were Chestnut Spirit Dyes or Acrylics.
